2nd Finance	7.8824
3rd Mkt Access	8.1176
4th Export Competitivess	9.5294

- **Priorities Breakdown:** Analysis is based on taking the average of all surveys received with rankings from 1-16 (1 being highest priority and 16 being lowest priority). Across the board, there isn't a high standard of deviation between activities/subcommittees.
- **Highest Ranked Priority:** Action Item #1 is ranked as the most important activity (i.e. communicating RE&EE to Sec of Commerce and staff)
- **Highest Number of Subcommittee Members To-Date**: Finance has the highest number of subcommittee members to-date. Finance is a top priority for the RE&EE sector as a whole.
- Highest Priority Standard of Deviation: Mkt Access had the highest standard of deviation between priorities. Within this
 category, "Analyzing international markets to highlight early wins" was ranked the top priority (rating of 5.6) and
 "Recommendations for offsetting Chinese Market manipulation" was ranked with the lowest priority (rating of 12.25), perhaps
 due to specificity of this market over others.
- Highest/ Lowest Priority Items Across Subcommittees: Highest priority item is "Communicate the REEE opportunity to the Secretary of Commerce and staff" under Mkt Outreach and Education. Lowest priority item is "Review the new exporting app and other tools for assisting US exporters and buyers" under Export Competitiveness.
